Tipperary Bealtaine 2023

Open Call to Tipperary Artists Deadline 12 noon **Monday 12 December** 2022

Each year in the month of May, Bealtaine is presented as a nationwide festival celebrating the arts and creativity as we age. The festival is an initiative of Age & Opportunity, the national organisation that promotes active and engaged living as we get older.

Tipperary County Council Arts Office runs an extensive, interactive programme throughout the county and, in recent times, has taken the lead in programming the festival with its partner Tipperary Libraries.

For the 2023 Bealtaine programme, as in 2022, we are issuing an open call to Tipperary-based artists to become involved. This open call, with a deadline of 12 noon Monday 12 December, invites artists to submit a written proposal for an event or engagement project, culminating in a showcase during the month of May 2023.

We would like to hear from Tipperary-based professional artists, or groups of artists, from across all artforms.

Artists who wish to respond to this open call will, ideally, be required to demonstrate that they have already engaged with older people (or an organisation working with older people) in relation to the proposed concept or idea. However, artists with a well-formed idea and clear plan for engagement in which they have identified a particular context or physical setting in which older people can actively participate can also submit proposals. The selected artists will work closely with the older people in presenting and/or creating the work. The Tipperary Arts Office is keen to engage older people as makers and as audiences for the arts.

The funding available to each project will range from €1,000 to €3,500 depending on size, scale and reach of the proposal.

Artists who are successful in the open call process will be required to attend two networking and capacity-building events which will include topics such as good practice in creative aging, working in participant-led initiatives, evaluation, reflection and will be an opportunity for sharing learning. A stipend (separate to the project proposal) will be paid for attendance.

To date the Bealtaine Festival has comprised exhibitions, concerts, dance, storytelling, theatre productions, choral events, tours to and residencies in care settings, workshops and writer's events. Projects have been delivered in organisations in which older people are active or which work with older people, e.g. care settings, Active Retired, resident's associations, libraries, book clubs, choirs, Men's Sheds, ICA etc.

Health & Safety Information: All potential health and safety risks must be fully considered and addressed for all Bealtaine events. Events must take place in accordance with current government health guidelines as well as Tipperary Arts Office's own Health & Safety policies.

How to respond to the open call:

The application process is straightforward. We are looking for information on:

- You: tell us about yourself and your practice, including any previous experience or training in working with older people and why you are interested in working with older people? Please include your CV
- The proposed project. Please provide a short outline of the proposed project: Why are you proposing this project?
 - Where or in what setting do you propose to work, and with whom? Let us know if you have already made contact with the organisation or setting.
 - What do you propose to do?
 - In what practical ways will older people be engaged (e.g. as workshop participants, cocreators or audience members)?
 - What are your desired outcomes for the participants/audiences?
 - What you propose to have as a showcase of the work and where will this take place? What are your timelines? When will your project commence and conclude? While Bealtaine runs throughout the month of May, residencies may commence in advance of this date

Please provide a budget in support of your proposal

Note: If successful, you will be required to provide publicity materials to support the promotion of the project and your work by Friday 24 February 2023. We understand fact that some projects may not have commenced at that stage. In this case, we will ask for text to explain the project and suitable images for promotion.

Successful applicants will also be required to attend two networking and training events.

The assessment process will take place before the end of December and you will be informed of the outcome of this process on or before 22nd December 2022.

THE GOLDEN FLEECE AWARD Call for Applications for the 2023 Golden Fleece Award

The Trustees of the Golden Fleece Award invite applications for the 2023 Golden Fleece Award.

The Golden Fleece Award provides funding for artists working in all forms of visual, craft and applied arts. It is the largest prize open to both artists and makers in Ireland, and it aims to provide resources for creative practitioners to innovate and develop their work at a critical point in their careers. Emerging, mid-career, and established artists and makers currently resident in or originally from the island of Ireland are eligible to apply.

The Golden Fleece Award is an independent artistic prize established as a charitable bequest by Dublin-born artist, designer and educator Lillias Mitchell (1915-2000). Her intentions were set out in her Letter of Wishes to her Trustees, in which she stated that: *My wish is to give artists a 'boost' in times of particular need...* A Trust was formed to manage the Award following her death, and the first Golden Fleece Award was presented in 2002.

All applications are assessed by a specialist five-person Advisory Panel. Members of the Advisory Panel review the applications received and select a shortlist, before making recommendations to the Award's Trustees, who decide each year how the prize fund will be distributed. The Advisory Panel for the 2023 Golden Fleece Award includes **Angela O'Kelly** (Panel Chair, jeweller and Head of Design for Body & Environment at NCAD, Dublin), **Roger Bennett** (woodturner), **Hugh Mulholland** (Creative Director, Visual Arts at the Mac, Belfast), **Cliodhna Shaffrey** (Director, Temple Bar Gallery + Studios, Dublin), and **Dr Audrey Whitty** (Head of Collections & Learning, National Museum of Ireland).

The Golden Fleece Award normally consists of one or more main Awards, to which may be added smaller Merit / Commendation / Special Awards. The size of the total prize fund is usually in the region of €20,000. How the fund is divided among recipients in any given year is at the Trustees' discretion. In recent years, Awards of €12,000, €10,000, €5,000, €4,000 and €3,000 have been made. As a guide, applicants are generally advised to apply for funding in the region of €5,000 to €10,000.

Applications must be made via the Online Application Form on the Golden Fleece Award website before the deadline: **5pm, Friday 25 November 2022**

There is no entry fee. Shortlisted applicants will be notified in February 2023, and award recipients announced in March 2023.

The Charter also demonstrates a commitment to the participation of older people in the arts as artists, audiences, creators, critics, teachers and learners. It considers elements such as accessibility, participation, dialogue, communication, diversity, policy and programming.

Arts Council seeks advisory, research and assessment services in Festivals

The Arts Council is seeking the procurement of Festival Advisory, Assessment and Research services to support the delivery of the Arts Council's Festival Policy and Strategy 2020-2025.

We currently wish to encourage qualification applications from candidates in festivals and event management and we will be running mini-competitions for Advisory, Assessment and Research services through the Arts Council's Dynamic Purchasing System (DPS) which allows for a greater diversity of voices as we work to support and develop the arts in Ireland in 2023.

The Artform Support Service Dynamic Purchasing System (DPS) has been launched on eTenders (RFT 215450 - AC/2022/16).

The DPS is a two stage process. The first stage is the qualification stage and involves applicants qualifying to be members of categories and sub-categories within the DPS: eg. Adviser Services (Category) Festivals (Sub-Category), by demonstrating sufficient skills and experience. Membership will be valid for the life of the DPS (10 years) and new candidates can join at any time during this period. In the second stage, qualified candidates will be invited to apply for opportunities within their categories/sub-categories when they arise.

Applicants may apply to: provide application assessment services, provide policy advice or conduct research projects. Those with a demonstrable background and experience in: festival and event programmes and management, festival and events academic research or arts policy development may wish to apply.

Autumn... and Winter... As If Trying Not To Own The Earth

A year-long dance and food activism project that you can watch and/or participate in

... As If Trying Not To Own The Earth is a dance and food activism project that you can watch and/or participate in, lasting for a full calendar year.

The project examines our connection with nature, and our role within our food system and the wider context of climate justice. It highlights a need to reconnect with our bodies and with the Earth in a way that is sustainable. It is organised by calendar seasons (Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter), and it focuses both on the growing of food, and the preparation of food. The premise is that of people trying things they are not experts at. From her base in Cloughjordan Ecovillage and Cloughjordan Farm, in each calendar season Instant Dissidence's Rita Marcalo collaborates with two people (a grower and a food preparation person): she teaches them to dance, and they teach her to grow and prepare food. Then at the end of each calendar season they present the creative outputs of the project.

Digital Memories Collection

The 'Digital Memories Collection' is a community focused exhibition in the Thomas MacDonagh Museum's gallery and on the museum's new website. The exhibition highlights personal items offered by the public that tell interesting or unusual stories.

The exhibition was a collaboration between artist and photographer Benedict Hutchinson and the Thomas MacDonagh Museum in Cloughjordan.

In August 2022 The Museum hosted a 'Create Digital Memories' event and invited the local community to identify a personal object that was meaningful to their life story and bring it to be photographed as part on National Heritage Week. This project was open to everyone, young or old, whether new to the parish or going back generations.

The resulting exhibition displays 31 objects, each one tells an interesting or unusual story. The Collection contains many major themes including the social and cultural history; 20th century Irish politics; technological innovations in the home and in business; and international activism on social justice issues. There are also deeply personal themes linked to arts & crafts, literature, memorabilia, skills and travel, with stories that evoke specific memories of families and friends around the world, both past and present.
