Have a Safe and Happy Thristmas from All at Tipperary Fire & Rescue Service

On the 1st day of Christmas - Make sure you test your smoke alarm

On the 2nd day of Christmas - Check your Christmas tree lights, make sure they conform to a British Standard. In addition, check you have the correct fuse. Always switch them off and unplug them when you go to bed or leave the house.

On the 3rd day of Christmas - Never leave candles burning whilst unattended

On the 4th day of Christmas - Make sure you, your family and any guests that may be staying are aware of what they need to do in the event of a fire. Make a fire escape plan.

On the 5th day of Christmas - Never overload electrical sockets

On the 6th day of Christmas - Never leave cooking unattended

On the 7th day of Christmas – Decorations can burn easily- don't attach them to lights or heaters

On the 8th day of Christmas - Make sure that candles and cigarettes are properly extinguished before you go to bed.



On the 9th day of Christmas - Never place candles or any other naked flame near a Christmas tree. As your tree begins to dry out it becomes highly flammable.

On the 10th day of Christmas - Keep matches and lighters well away from children.

On the 11th day of Christmas – Take time to check on elderly relatives and friends this Christmas-make sure they are Fire Safe.

On the 12th day of Christmas - Celebrate Christmas and New Year safely. The risk of accidents, especially in the kitchen, is greater after alcohol is consumed.

Clonmel Town Bus




There are 3 New Public Transport Routes in Clonmel CL1, CL2 & CL9.

Community Climate Action Fund

Introduction

Tipperary County Council has appointed a Community Climate Action Officer whose role it will be to help local communities do their part to help Ireland transition to carbon-neutral status. The role will also involve helping community groups apply for a share in the competitive Community Climate Action Fund in which €700,000 fund has been allocated to Tipperary County Council. The Community Climate Action Programme is funded by the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications.

Why the Community Climate Action Fund Exists

Ireland is aiming to become a climate neutral economy and resilient society by 2050. In line with EU ambition, Ireland has committed to achieve an average 7% per annum reduction in overall greenhouse gas emissions from 2021 to 2023. Becoming a climate resilient society will help us to cope with the impacts of a changing climate.

Who can Apply

Community Groups; must be a not for profit organisation, must be located in the operational area of Tipperary County Council and must be registered with the PPN.

The Three Tiers of Funding

No match funding required (100% funded)

Small Scale Projects – €20,000 or less

Medium Scale Projects – between €21,000 to €50,000

Large Scale Projects – between €51,000 to €100,000

Adult Literacy for Life works on the premise that 'Literacy changes lives'. This phrase is recurrent from adults who have taken the step to learn to fill out forms, use their smartphone, write their Christmas cards, read to their kids, and so on.

Adult Literacy for Life aims to build an Ireland where every adult has the necessary language, literacy, numeracy and digital skills to fully engage in society and reach their potential.

This cannot be done by one organisation or community alone. It works best when done in collaboration. On 11 December 2023, Tipperary had its first Regional Adult Literacy Coalition meeting. This Coalition is a space for existing activity to be recognised, harnessed and shared, as well as a space for exploring and supporting new collaborations and partnerships.

Barnardos new Adult Service-The Boarded Out Practical Supports Service

In July 2023, Barnardos launched a new, free national service for adults, the Boarded Out Practical Support Service for Adults. The service was established to provide support to people who were boarded out as children prior to the introduction of the 1991 Child Care Act. Boarded out /fostered /farmed out /nursed out are terms used to describe a system of care for children that existed in Ireland from the early 1900's up until the introduction of the childcare act in 1991.

Many children born in mother and baby institutions, county homes and private nursing homes to unmarried mothers were nursed out as infants by the authorities to families other than their own. Children were also boarded out from families where there was poverty or illness or a parent had died. Children in industrial schools were also boarded out to farms and homes around the country.

For some children, being boarded out/ fostered was a positive experience, unfortunately, other children had more traumatic experiences. Natalie Johnson, Project Coordinator for the Boarded Out Practical Support Service said "For some people, the trauma of early separation from their mothers, and the subsequent experience of abuse, missed educational opportunities, forced labour, and lack of information about their identity and reasons for being boarded out can have lifelong consequences because childhood lasts a lifetime".

Barnardos new national service offers a wide range of practical supports to people who were boarded out. The practical supports include; support to access early life records, support to access health community and social services, support with isolation and loneliness, assistance in filling out forms and grant applications, advocacy, information and signposting, referral to Barnardos therapeutic supports.

One of the gentlemen the service is currently supporting is Noel*.

82-year-old Noel was boarded out to a farming family in rural Ireland when he was a child. Noel never knew his birth family. Although he was looked after by the family he was placed with, he was regularly kept home from school to work long hours on the farm. After years of struggling at school, Noel left when he was just 13 with very poor literacy skills. He continued to work unpaid on the farm until he was 16 and then left for England to try to make a new life for himself.

60 years later, Noel contacted Barnardos Boarded Out Practical Support Service, as he needed help filling out forms to access his birth information. Carol, a Community Support Worker from the service, visited Noel in his home and assisted him to complete the forms and understand the birth history information he received.

During his meetings with Carol, Noel confided that he struggled to cook his meals, complete household chores due to mobility issues and that he felt isolated living alone. Carol contacted the local primary care team and advocated for a home care package for Noel. She also arranged for Meals on Wheels to be delivered daily. Carol's visits helped Noel to feel less alone, but she also put him in touch with the local Family Resource Centre so he can access local groups. Noel now has a social outlet where he is connected to his community.

The **Boarded Out Practical Supports Service** is open to anyone regardless of how long they were boarded out, whether the boarding out was a formal or informal arrangement or whether the experience was positive or negative.
